Isla then reports back to store managers to let them know which staff members aren't checking for ID.

But the role of school girl doesn't end there.

"We often do undercover work," says Isla. "A couple of weeks ago I was undercover as a school girl talking to the coach of a swimming club in Berkshire.

"I was posing as a 15-year-old trying to join the club and we were having a chat and we were recording the conversation."

The coach, who was under surveillance for management issues, inadvertently gave Isla information which then helped out her client.

Isn't this a dangerous line of work for a teenager to be in?

"I'm never put in a dangerous situation," says Isla steadfastedly. "We never have to do things completely on our own and if ever we didn't feel comfortable doing something we would just say 'no I'm not doing that'.

"We do have a couple of guys who work for the company who can come out if there's a situation that could possibly get a bit 'heated'".

Most of the work is done for business bosses who are keen to uncover corporate fraud or theft within companies.

"We followed a guy who'd come out of Reading County Court - that was a case of the gentleman being in court for allegedly stealing intellectual property from his company."

Isla's colleagues have in the past gone undercover at companies posing as employees, while other businesses suspect employees of unlawful absenteeism.

"A company rang up to say they've got an employee who's been off work for six weeks with a sprained ankle, and we've got some great photos of this guy working as a builder," says Isla.

She adds: "There was a guy off work because he'd hurt his back, so much so that he couldn't actually walk round his house. But then we saw him score a winning goal at a football match, which was rather interesting!"

Isla is one of the youngest private investigators in the country, and it's a job she clearly relishes.

"I'm not going to lie, it is really cool being able to say that you are a private investigator," she says.

"But there is more to it than just the glamour of being able to 'say' you're a detective. There's what you have to 'do' while being a detective, and it doesn't involve wearing trench coats and dark glasses and hiding around corners!"

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
